Course description

Sociology is the exciting study of behaviour by people in society; theories that attempt to explain what created that behaviour and how it came about. Sociology examines institutions within society, how they are organised and developed and theories what they may become in the future.

Higher education opportunities

Sociology is accepted for entry onto a wide range of higher education courses particularly those in the public services sector such as nursing and midwifery, occupational therapy, psychology and respected in the fields of law and humanities.

Communication	Discussions and debates concerned with topic issues within the subject.	
Teamwork	Students work together to develop their interpersonal and confidence skills.	
Leadership	Students work together to develop leadership qualities within teams.	
Taking responsibility	Students are required to be proactive in the tracking and monitoring of their progress. They are also required to identify areas for development and to utilise the support systems that are in place.	
Problem-solving	Application of knowledge to the demands of the subject area.	
Reflective thinking	Monitoring of progress and reflecting on how to further develop and the ability to reflect on how key sociologists view society.	
Independent enquiry	Students work together and independently to research and to consider how key concepts fit into our understanding of sociological debates. Students will also show independence through home learning activities.
